HRSA Teaching Health Center Planning and Development Program

(Application Deadline: December 12, 2022)

Aligns with Dogwood's Strategic Priorities: Health & Wellness Goal 2: Increase Access to Whole-Person Health Care and Economic Development Goal 2: Promote Workforce Readiness
The purpose of this grant program is to make awards to establish new accredited community-based primary care medical or dental residency programs and residency programs in family medicine, internal medicine, pediatrics, internal medicine-pediatrics, psychiatry, obstetrics and gynecology, general dentistry, pediatric dentistry, or geriatrics to address shortages in the primary care physician and dental workforce shortages and challenges faced by in rural and underserved communities. This NOFO will support the establishment of approved graduate medical and dental residency training programs for physicians and dentists. This program aims to increase primary care physician and dental residency training in community-based patient care settings by providing funds to support the development of new programs in these settings, which are often located in underserved areas where resources may not be easily attainable. DOL Nursing Expansion Grant Program

This FOA will address bottlenecks in training the United States nursing workforce and expand and diversify the pipeline of qualified nursing professionals through two training tracks. The first track (Nurse Education Professional Track) will increase the number of clinical and vocational nursing instructors and educators by training new or upskilling experienced current or former nurses (including retired nurses) into advanced postsecondary credentialing necessary for nurses to become clinical and vocational nursing instructors and educators. The second track (Nursing Career Pathway Track) will train frontline healthcare professionals and paraprofessionals, including direct care workers, to advance along a career pathway and attain postsecondary credentials needed for middle- to high-skilled nursing occupations during the grant period of performance. Applicants will propose strategies to improve nursing professional, clinical instructor, and educator recruitment, preparation, development, training, and retention. The intent of the HVRP grant program is to obtain high-quality career outcomes for veterans experiencing homelessness. The Department encourages applicants to propose strategies to achieve economic opportunity, address historical inequities, and provide equitable access and outcomes to marginalized groups. To meet the fluctuations in the population and changing needs of veterans experiencing homelessness, VETS requires grant recipients to provide an array of client-centered services utilizing a case management approach that directly assists homeless veterans and provides critical linkages to a variety of support services available in their local communities. The HVRP approach is focused on obtaining high-quality career outcomes for the veteran. Veterans are to receive the job training and employment services required to re-enter and be successful in the labor force. To realize long-term benefits for veterans experiencing homelessness, grant recipients must address the complex employment-related requirements and support services necessary to meet the needs of this population. This can be achieved either through direct services or through a robust referral system establishing tools, resources, and partnerships to identify, recruit, prepare, and support veterans experiencing homelessness for employment success. Through one of these methods, grant recipients will provide job placement, job training, job development, career counseling, and resume preparation services among other services to assist with obtaining high-quality career outcomes. Statewide Training and Technical Assistance Services for Community-Based Substance Misuse Prevention (Application Deadline: December 16, 2022)

The NC Department of Health and Human Services' Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities and Substance Use Services (DMH/DD/SUS) is launching a redesign of its substance misuse prevention system supported by Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant (SABG) funds administered by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). A central element of the redesign is implementing a results-based management (RBM) system to improve health outcomes for North Carolinians across the lifespan by preventing and significantly reducing substance use and related problems. Training and Technical Assistance (T/TA) Contractors selected through this RFA will support this transition by helping primary prevention initiatives supported by DMH/DD/SUS with SABG funds use RBM processes to significantly reduce substance misuse and related problems across the lifespan and sustain these reductions into the future. Contractors will also help DMH/DD/SUS strengthen and expand the primary prevention workforce and its ability to document desired outcomes.

Training and Technical Assistance Services consists of two scopes of work. Applicants may apply for one or more scopes of work. (1) Training and technical assistance (T/TA) for SABG-funded primary prevention initiatives (2) Primary prevention workforce development, which includes: building/enhancing prevention infrastructure to support future prevention efforts; and enhancing primary prevention workforce professional development through certification and other efforts. HUD Fair Housing Initiatives Program Private Enforcement Initiative (Application Deadline: December 5, 2022)

The Fair Housing Initiatives Program (FHIP) funds fair housing organizations and other non-profits that assist individuals who believe that they have been victims of housing discrimination. FHIP provides funds to eligible organizations through competitive grants under several initiatives to carry out enforcement activities to prevent or eliminate discriminatory housing practices and inform individuals of their rights and responsibilities under the Fair Housing Act. The Initiatives are: the Fair Housing Organization Initiative (FHOI), the Private Enforcement Initiative (PEI), and the Education and Outreach Initiative (EOI). PEI provides funding to private, non-profit fair housing enforcement organizations that meet statutory requirements to conduct testing, investigate violations and obtain enforcement of the rights granted under the Fair Housing Act or State or local laws that are substantially equivalent to the rights and remedies provided in the Fair Housing Act. HUD Fair Housing Initiative Program - Fair Housing Organization Initiative (Application Deadline: December 6, 2022)

The Fair Housing Initiatives Program (FHIP) provides funding to fair housing organizations and other non-profits that assist individuals who believe that they have been victims of housing discrimination. Currently FHIP provides funds to eligible organizations through competitive grants under several initiatives to carry out enforcement activities to prevent or eliminate discriminatory housing practices and inform individuals of their rights and responsibilities under the Fair Housing Act. This FHOI NOFO makes available \$1.825 million under the Continued Development Component (CDC) and \$1.875 million under the Establishing New Organizations Component (ENOC). The CDC component provides funds to non-profit fair housing organizations to build their capacity and effectiveness to conduct enforcement-related activities eligible for funding such as: investigating discrimination allegations based on sexual orientation and gender identity or expanding testing expertise and experience in mortgage lending discrimination or appraisal bias. The ENOC provides funds to Qualified Fair Housing Enforcement Organizations (QFHOs) ("sponsoring organizations") to establish new, separate organizations ("sponsored organizations") to engage in fair housing work, particularly in areas of the country which are currently unserved or underserved by fair housing enforcement organizations. Eligible activities under the ENOC are those that establish a single organization to become a viable regional/local fair housing enforcement organization that will conduct testing and other fair housing enforcement-related activities. Legal Services for Homeless Veterans and Veterans At-Risk for Homelessness Grant (Application Deadline: December 30, 2022)

The new Legal Services for Homeless Veterans and Veterans At-Risk for Homelessness Grant Program's purpose is to provide legal services grants to public or non-profit private entities who will provide legal services to eligible Veterans who are homeless or at risk for homelessness. The goal of the Grant Program is to assist homeless and at-risk Veterans who have unaddressed needs for legal services, which may create barriers to housing stability. Services provided to Veterans under this Grant Program are designed to help Veterans increase housing stability by providing legal services

HUD FY2022 Healthy Homes and Weatherization Cooperation Demonstration (Application Deadline: January 5, 2023)

The purpose of this program is to fund Healthy Homes and Weatherization Cooperation Demonstration grants in up to 5 communities that provide housing interventions in lower-income households that are served by both HUD's Healthy Homes Production (HHP) program and DOE's Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) to determine whether coordination between the programs concerning the implementation of healthy homes remediation activities and energy conservation measures achieves cost-effectiveness and better outcomes in improving the safety and quality of homes. The following are the major goals and objectives of this NOFO: (1) Demonstrate effective strategies for coordination between HUD's HHP and DOE's WAP programs that maximize program efficiencies and benefits to occupants (2) Reduce WAP deferrals through coordination with HHP programs. (3) Demonstrate sustainable models of inter-program cooperation, including data sharing, reporting, and targeting/recruiting clients. (4) Demonstrate effective models for the sustainable financing of coordinated healthy homes/weatherization interventions. (5) Support the collection of data to evaluate the housing interventions conducted through inter-program coordination (e.g., program cost efficiencies that can be achieved, improvements in indoor environmental quality, improved health outcomes, and additional safety benefits to households). Only current holders of an active DOE Weatherization Assistance Program (WAP) grant, WAP subgrantee (not a contract or partnership) or a HUD Healthy Homes Production (HHP) grant (not an HHP subgrantee, contract, or partnership) is eligible to apply for this HHWCD grant program. HUD Self-Help Homeownership Opportunity Program (SHOP) (Application Deadline: January 23, 2023)

This SHOP NOFO announces the availability of \$12,500,000 in SHOP Grant funds to be awarded to national and regional non-profit organizations and consortia to facilitate and encourage innovative homeownership opportunities on a national, geographically diverse basis through the provision of self-help homeownership housing programs. Applicants must propose to use a significant amount of SHOP Grant funds in at least two states. SHOP Grant funds must be used for land acquisition, infrastructure improvements, and for reasonable and necessary planning and administration costs (not to exceed 10 percent). The construction or rehabilitation costs of each SHOP unit must be funded with other leveraged public and private funds. The average SHOP Grant expenditure for the combined costs of land acquisition and infrastructure improvements must not exceed \$15,000 per SHOP unit. SHOP units must be decent, safe, and sanitary non-luxury dwellings that comply with state and local codes, ordinances, and zoning requirements. The SHOP units must be sold to homebuyers at prices below the prevailing market price. Homebuyers must be low-income and must contribute a significant amount of sweat equity towards the development of the SHOP units. A homebuyer's sweat equity contribution must not be mortgaged or otherwise restricted upon future sale of the SHOP unit. Volunteer labor is also required. [LEARN MORE](#)

HEAL Initiative: Preventing Opioid Misuse and Co-Occurring Conditions by Intervening on Social Determinants (R01 - Clinical Trials Optional)**(LOI Deadline: January 2, 2023; Application Deadline: February 2, 2023)**

In April 2018, the National Institutes of Health (NIH) launched the Helping to End Addiction Long-term Initiative or HEAL Initiative, an aggressive, trans-agency effort to speed scientific solutions to stem the national opioid public health crisis. Through this initiative, the National Institute on Drug Abuse, in partnership with other NIH Institutes, Centers, and Offices, requests applications for studies designed to develop and test interventions to prevent opioid misuse, opioid use disorder, and co-occurring conditions by intervening on social determinants of health (SDOH). NSF Racial Equity in STEM Education (Application Deadline: January 17, 2023)

Racial inequities often create barriers to STEM knowledge generation, as well as access to and participation in all aspects of STEM education, research, and the workforce. In ongoing efforts to address these disparities, NSF EHR seeks to support bold, groundbreaking, and potentially transformative projects that contribute to advancing racial equity in STEM education and workforce development through practice and/or fundamental or applied research. CDC Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health (REACH) (Estimated Application Deadline: March 13, 2023)

This 5-year program is to improve health, prevent chronic diseases, and reduce health disparities among racial and ethnic populations with the highest risk, or burden, of chronic disease, specifically for African Americans/Blacks, Hispanic Americans, Asian Americans, Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islanders, American Indians, and Alaska Natives by: (1) Supporting culturally tailored interventions to address to promote activities to decrease tobacco use, poor nutrition practices, and physical inactivity. (2) Supporting implementation, evaluation, and dissemination of practice- and evidence-based strategies of tobacco, nutrition, and physical activity collaborations that ultimately lead to reduced health disparities in chronic conditions of hypertension, heart disease, Type 2 diabetes, and obesity. (3) Supporting activities to enhance capacity to educate and promote the importance of immunization among racial and ethnic minority populations. (4) Linking community and clinical efforts to increase individual's access to health care and preventive care programs within their community. Funding will support recipients that: Have a history of successfully working with an established community coalition to address issues relating to health or other disparities; Select strategies that address the health disparities in the community based on results from a community health needs assessment process; and Have organizational capacity to effectively, efficiently, and immediately implement locally tailored evidence- and practice-based strategies. ACF Field-Initiated Approach to Addressing Racial Bias and Inequity in Child Welfare (Estimated Application Deadline: June 22, 2023)

The purpose of this NOFO would be to fund grants that support the development, implementation, and evaluation of field-initiated approaches to addressing racial bias and inequity in child welfare to improve the safety, stability, and well-being of families in traditionally underserved communities. This funding opportunity is intended to enable communities to design and lead targeted solutions to systemic issues of disproportionality experienced by racial and ethnic minorities at varying points across the child welfare continuum. During the project period, grant recipients will address identified barriers to the access of equitable services and treatment for underserved communities by proposing and implementing strategies that allow for inclusivity of those with lived experience, shared power in decision-making, and community led efforts towards strengthening and supporting families. Applicants will be required to submit supporting data from their respective states or communities that demonstrate disproportionality, and any pre-analysis (if available) that supports a description of the problem or statement of need. Upon award, grant recipients must be willing to complete a thorough exploration or assessment that at a minimum involves a review of current practices, policies, and service delivery to the target population. Ultimately, applicants must demonstrate readiness and a commitment to inclusive, co-designed solutions to address issues of racial bias and inequity and reflect what communities say they need to thrive. Foundation for a Just Society (Application Deadline: Rolling)

The Foundation for a Just Society supports efforts that advance long-term, structural change and meet immediate needs that enable the women, girls, and LGBTQI people most affected by injustice to be leaders, strategists, and agents of change. We do not fund organizations that provide direct services without a vision for transformation. Our grantmaking seeks to build power and common cause among women, girls, and LGBTQI people and promote gender and racial justice. The decisions we make are guided by the leadership, values, strategies, and approaches within movements rather than a narrow understanding of single issues or quantifiable impact. We believe that solutions must be as sophisticated as the complex challenges they seek to address, and that deep and enduring transformation takes time. We prioritize multi-year, general operating support and avoid restrictions because organizations are able to work more strategically when they have the flexibility to recover from setbacks, seize opportunities, or shift tactics as needed. Our grants are made for up to three years and range in size from \$50,000-\$500,000 per year. We make grants to local, national, regional, and global organizations and networks that advance the rights of women, girls, and LGBTQI people with an emphasis on Francophone West Africa, Mesoamerica, South and Southeast Asia, and the US Southeast. RWJF Evidence for Action: Innovative Research to Advance Racial Equity (Application Deadline: Rolling)

2022 Mosaic Movement Infrastructure (Application Deadline: December 9, 2022)

This year, Mosaic will distribute \$5.5M to build local to national movement infrastructure that enhances diverse and collaborative engagement on four major policies and efforts intersecting with the environmental and justice communities - the Inflation Reduction Act, Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, Justice40, and 30x30. The Governor's Crime Commission (GCC) **(Application Deadline: January 31, 2023)**

The Governor's Crime Commission administers federal block grants for criminal justice, juvenile justice, and victims service programs in North Carolina. The Commission administers about \$100 million of grants each year and assures that money is disbursed according to federal and state governmental regulations during the life of the grants. The grants are awarded to government, education and social service agencies for innovative programs in the following areas: (1) Victims of Crime (2) Violence Against Women (3) Drug Control and System Improvement (4) Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention and (5) Law Enforcement. 2023 Byrne Justice Assistance Grants (JAG) **(Application Deadline: January 31, 2023)**

The Criminal Justice Improvement Committee seeks applications for Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) funding to provide criminal justice improvements to support law enforcement, prosecution and court programs. The following entities in North Carolina, which provide law enforcement services and support and training for law enforcement, are eligible to apply for funding: (1) Local Government Agencies including Law Enforcement (2) State Government Agencies Including State Law Enforcement (3) Colleges and Universities and (4) Nonprofit Organizations. Authorized under 42 U.S.C. §3751(a) funding may be used to hire additional personnel and/or purchase equipment, supplies, contractual support, training, technical assistance, and information systems for criminal justice, including for any one or more of the following program areas: law enforcement, prosecution, indigent defense, courts, crime prevention and education, corrections and community corrections, drug treatment and enforcement, planning, evaluation, technology improvement, crime victim and witness initiatives, election security, and mental health programs and related law enforcement and corrections programs, including behavioral programs and crisis intervention teams. Funding ranges \$10,000 to \$225,000 per year depending on which Program Priority the applying agency selects.

2023 Children's Justice Act (CJA) **(Application Deadline: January 31, 2023)**

The Juvenile Justice Planning Committee seeks applications for Children's Justice Act (CJA) Grant funds. Children's Justice Act funds are not designed to support primary prevention programs or treatment service. Eligible programs in North Carolina must provide services through frontend, intake, assessment, investigative, and prosecutorial phases of child welfare. Grant funds should be used to implement State Task Force recommendations in the following three categories: (1) Investigative, administrative, and judicial handling of cases of child abuse and neglect, including child sexual abuse and exploitation, as well as cases involving suspected child maltreatment related fatalities and cases involving a potential combination of jurisdictions, such as intrastate, interstate, Federal-State, and State-Tribal, in a manner which reduces the additional trauma to the child victim and the victim's family and which also ensures procedural fairness to the accused. (2) Support of Experimental, Model, or Demonstration Programs for testing innovative approaches and techniques which may improve the prompt and successful resolution of civil and criminal court proceedings or enhance the effectiveness of judicial and administrative action in child abuse and neglect cases, particularly child sexual abuse and exploitation cases, including the enhancement of performance of court appointed attorneys and guardians ad litem for children, and which also ensure procedural fairness to the accused. (3) Reform of State laws, ordinances, regulations, protocols, and procedures to provide comprehensive protection for children, which may include those children involved in reports of child abuse or neglect with a potential combination of jurisdictions, such as intrastate, interstate, Federal-State, and State-Tribal, from child abuse and neglect, including child sexual abuse and exploitation, while ensuring fairness to all affected persons. 2023 Juvenile Justice/Title II (JJ) **(Application Deadline: January 31, 2023)**

The Governor's Crime Commission acknowledges violence as a public health issue impacting communities across the State of North Carolina. Research shows that exposure to firearm violence—including as a victim or witness—makes it twice as likely an adolescent will commit a violent act within two years. There are proven community violence intervention (CVI) strategies for reducing community violence through tools other than incarceration. The CVI Program priority is designed to address multiple forms of violence impacting adolescents and young adults, particularly in communities with high rates of violence. Examples of the types of programs appropriate for consideration under the CVI Program priority may include, and are not limited to, the following: (1) Community-based alternatives to incarceration for status offenders and other youth who need temporary placement, crisis intervention, shelter, and aftercare; (2) Counseling, training, and mentoring programs which may be in support of academic tutoring, vocational and technical training, and drug and violence prevention counseling; (3) Positive youth development programs for delinquent and other at-risk youth who are exposed to violence and more. 2023 Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) (Application Deadline: January 31, 2023)

The Crime Victim Services Committee seeks applications for Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funds to provide direct services to crime victims and their families. Under this funding source, the Commission is particularly interested in applications that meet the needs of underserved populations, rural areas of the state, and groups that currently lack services. The Commission encourages programs that involve partnerships, collaborations, and best practices to meet the needs of crime victims. The Crime Victims Fund provides financial assistance that support a variety of programs, services, and activities to support and assist victims of crime. Services under this grant program are defined as those efforts that (1) respond to the emotional and physical needs of crime victims; (2) assist primary and secondary victims of crime to stabilize their lives after a victimization; (3) assist victims to understand and participate in the criminal justice system; and (4) provide victims of crime with a measure of safety and security as appropriate to their victimization. 2023 Violence Against Women Act (VAWA-STOP) (Application Deadline: January 31, 2023)

The STOP (Services, Training, Officers, and Prosecutors) Violence Against Women Formula Grant Program promotes a coordinated, multidisciplinary approach to improving the criminal justice system's response to violent crimes against women. STOP encourages the development and strengthening of effective law enforcement, prosecution strategies and victim services in cases involving violent crimes against women. The Governor's Office is interested in supporting the priority areas identified below. The GCC encourages programs that involve partnerships, collaborations, and best practices to meet the needs of crime victims and others across the state. GCC encourages the applicants to develop projects that: (1) Support victims of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking by ensuring that the stigma of reporting is no longer a barrier for victims. (2) Providing resources for training to help law enforcement better understand victims and ultimately reduce any stigma around reporting. Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) (Application Deadline: Not Specified, Anticipated January 2023)

The EMPG Program provides states with federal funds to sustain and enhance all-hazards emergency management capabilities.
