





A Persistently Rural North Carolina

- 2nd-largest rural population in the nation with 3.6 million people.
- 2nd-largest number of small towns <10,000 in the nation.
- Urban centers less dense and more dispersed 24 of 78 rural counties are within Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs).
- Rural communities more dense.
- 78 (of 100) counties & 403 (of 556) towns.

6 counties with an average population density of 750 people per square mile or more.



- Broadband needed for workforce development, educational success and healthcare access.

 - Highly engaged nonprofits and municipal organizations
 - Growing opportunities for small businesses
 - Emphasis on livable communities
- Good access to postsecondary education and trainings










DHT Region - Poorer?

Poverty Rate: 2021








DHT Region - Sicker?


2023 County Health Rankings










Education for Tomorrow's Labor Market







HISPANIC/LATINO: UP 7%





Non-Working Age to Working Age Population Ratio: 2020

















Percentage of Total Employment by Business Size, 2019



Percentage of Total Employment by Business Size, 2019 Non-Dogwood Health Trust Counties








Long-Term Impact of COVID-19
